



STATE OF NEVADA COVID-19 UPDATES

[MARCH 24, 2020] Governor Sisolak signed Emergency Directive 007

In order to mitigate the spread of COVID-19, Governor Sisolak <u>signed an emergency</u> <u>directive</u> prohibiting gatherings of groups of 10 or more in any <u>indoor or outdoor public area</u>, public or private, *unless:*

- (1) the individuals live in the same household,
- (2) they are working or shopping at an essential business, or
- (3) they are providing an essential service to the public.
- This Directive also applies to the public's use of recreational equipment. This Directive will remain in effect until April 16, 2020, unless extended. Click here for a new guidance document.

[MARCH 24, 2020] Governor Sisolak signed <u>Emergency Regulations</u> promulgated by the Nevada Board of Pharmacy

The regulation restricts the prescribing and dispensing of chloroquine and hydroxychloroquine. The Board adopted this emergency regulation in consultation with the Governor's COVID-19 Medical Advisory Team to prevent the hoarding and stockpiling of chloroquine and hydroxychloroquine during the COVID-19 pandemic, which may result in a shortage of supplies of these drugs for legitimate medical purposes. Currently, hydroxychloroquine is under investigation for use in the treatment of COVID-19. At this time, the safety and efficacy of the drug for the treatment of COVID-19 have not been established. [MARCH 24, 2020] Nevada Department of Health & Human Services issued an <u>updated Technical</u> <u>Bulletin</u> on Child Care Guidance & Resources during COVID-19.

[MARCH 24, 2020] Nevada is one of three states so far to be approved by the FDA to develop and approve COVID-19 test kits.

[MARCH 24, 2020] NHRC Medical Advisory Team (MAT) and the Department of Health and Human Services released <u>updated testing information and guidelines</u> for health care providers.

PRIVATE SECTOR UPDATES & GUIDANCE


Gov. Sisolak announced on March 22, 2020 the formation of the COVID-19 Private Sector Response, Relief and Recovery Task Force (RRR) that focuses Private Sector resources to support the public sector in tackling COVID-19.

Sector in tacking COVID-19.		
Food & Beverage Establishments	 Businesses that offer carry-out, delivery, and drive-through food and beverage service may continue to do so but eating and drinking inside restaurants and bars is temporarily prohibited. Charitable food distribution sites, including the meals being distributed to our students in wake of the school closings, along with grocery stores, should remain fully open and operational. 	
Gaming Industry	 The Governor announced that all gaming machines, devices, tables, games, and any equipment related to gaming activity will be shut down. Restaurants and bars located within gaming properties will be subject to the same restrictions as those outside of gaming establishments. 	
Cannabis Industry	 Licensed cannabis dispensaries are permitted to continue operations on a direct deliveryonly basis. Dispensaries are not permitted to conduct onsite transactions at this time.

LEVEL 4 – DO NOT TRAVEL	LEVEL 2 – SPECIAL PRECAUTIONS
The Department of State advises U.S. citizens to avoid all international travel due to the global impact of COVID-19. In countries where commercial departure options remain available, U.S. citizens who live in the United States should arrange for immediate return to the United States, unless they are prepared to remain abroad for an indefinite period. U.S. citizens who live abroad should avoid all international travel. Many countries are experiencing COVID-19 outbreaks and implementing travel restrictions and mandatory quarantines, closing borders, and prohibiting non-citizens from entry with little advance notice. Airlines have cancelled many international flights and several cruise operators have suspended operations or cancelled trips. If you choose to travel internationally, your travel plans may be severely disrupted, and you may be forced to remain outside of the United States for an indefinite timeframe.	 Ongoing community transmission of respiratory illness caused by the novel (new) coronavirus (COVID-19) is occurring globally. Older adults and people of any age with serious chronic medical conditions should consider postponing nonessential travel. Travelers should avoid contact with sick people and wash their hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not readily available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol. All travelers should monitor their health and practice social distancing for 14 days after returning from travel. Travelers who are sick with fever, cough, or have trouble breathing should stay home and call ahead before seeking medical care.
