




COVID-19 BY THE NUMBERS - NEVADA

OF FEDERAL REQUESTS STATUS • The State of Nevada has submitted 4 COVID-19 testing component requests. Nevada has received 1 shipment of COVID-19 testing components (reagent). Nevada has 3 pending requests for COVID-19 testing components and has been **Test Kits** told by the federal government that these items are on an indefinite backlog. ***Test kits acquired by community organizations, hospitals, private labs and entities through purchase or donation cannot be tracked by the State of Nevada. Nevada has received the 3rd and final push of PPE from the Strategic National Stockpile (SNS). Nevada is distribute PPE based upon the Regional Distribution System and **PPE** population-based proportion. (Personal Protective Equipment) ***The State of Nevada stockpile inventory of PPE has been distributed to the 3 Local Health Authorities (LHAs) and rural counties on a needs-based and population-based proportion based on the 2018 Census Bureau estimates. As new shipments are delivered from federal agencies, they will continue to be distributed throughout the State.

STATE OF NEVADA COVID-19 UPDATES

[APRIL 7, 2020] Governor Steve Sisolak announced that California would be loaning 50 state owned ventilators to Nevada through May 1. The ventilators will help patients in Nevada hospitals battle COVID-19.

[APRIL 7, 2020] The Interim Finance Committee approved moving more than \$6 million from a state Disaster Relief budget account to the state's Division of Emergency Management help address the COVID-10 pandemic. The final step comes after an April 1 approval by the Board of Examiners.

[APRIL 7, 2020] The IFC also released \$2 million in settlement funds to the United Way of Southern Nevada per the request of Attorney General Aaron Ford. The money will go toward temporary rent and mortgage assistance



LEVEL 4 – DO NOT TRAVEL	LEVEL 3 – AVOID NONESSENTIAL TRAVEL
The Department of State advises U.S. citizens to avoid all international travel due to the global impact of COVID-19. In countries where commercial departure options remain available, U.S. citizens who live in the United States should arrange for immediate return to the United States, unless they are prepared to remain abroad for an indefinite period. U.S. citizens who live abroad should avoid all international travel. Many countries are experiencing COVID-19 outbreaks and implementing travel restrictions and mandatory quarantines, closing borders, and prohibiting non-citizens from entry with little advance notice. Airlines have cancelled many international flights and several cruise operators have suspended operations or cancelled trips. If you choose to travel internationally, your travel plans may be severely disrupted, and you may be forced to remain outside of the United States for an indefinite timeframe.	 Widespread ongoing transmission of a respiratory illness caused by the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) is occurring globally. CDC recommends that travelers avoid all nonessential international travel. Older adults and people of any age with serious chronic medical conditions are at increased risk for severe disease. There may be limited access to adequate medical care in affected areas. US residents may have difficulty returning to the United States. Travelers should avoid contact with sick people and wash their hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not readily available, use an alcoholbased hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol. All international travelers should stay home for 14 days after returning from travel, monitor their health, and practice social distancing.
