



COVID-19 BY THE NUMBERS - NEVADA




*Nevada Hospital Association Status Updated Daily

STATUS OF FEDERAL REQUESTS		
 Nevada has received 3,000 reagent kits and 4,000 test swabs from HHS. Note: Test kits acquired by community organizations, hospitals, private labs and entities through purchase or donation cannot be tracked by the State of Nevada. 		
PPE (Personal Protective Equipment)	 Nevada received third and final push of PPE from the Strategic National Stockpile (SNS). Nevada distributed the federal SNS PPE based upon a Regional Distribution System to the 3 Local Health Authorities and counties last week. As additional PPE is acquired from federal agencies, donations and DEM purchases, it will continue to be distributed to the local health authorities and counties. Note: The State of Nevada stockpile inventory of PPE has been distributed to the 3 Local Health Authorities (LHAs) and rural counties on a needs-based and population-based proportion based on the 2018 Census Bureau estimates. 	
Other	 Nevada received 150 ventilators from the SNS through FEMA on April 10, 2020. On Wednesday, April 8, Nevada received a loan from Cal OES for 50 California state-owned ventilators for three weeks at no cost. HHS will direct additional ventilators to the state approximately 72 hours prior to the anticipated need. 	

STATE OF NEVADA COVID-19 UPDATES

[APRIL 14, 2020] Nevada Governor Steve Sisolak instructed DETR to backdate all Unemployment Insurance Claims to the earliest date of eligibility, since many have struggled to login due to the unprecedented volume. He also announced that Nevada expects to be among the early states that will be dispersing the additional \$600 from the CARES Act to those who qualify for it. Read more HERE.

[APRIL 15, 2020] DETR announced that Alorica, their new call center vendor, will begin assisting claimants with general questions related to the unemployment insurance filing process. The Department also rolled out a new recommended method for online filing, organized by <u>LAST</u> name: <u>A-K on Sundays, L-R on Mondays, S-Z on Tuesdays.</u>

[APRIL 15, 2020] Governor Sisolak signed <u>Directive 014</u> supporting districts and their schools to provide distance learning for their students. Additionally, it gives school superintendent Ebert the authority to waive or suspend certain laws that would prevent students from graduating on time. Find out the specifics <u>HERE</u>.

[APRIL 15, 2020] The Nevada Division of Public and Behavioral Health issued a cease and desist order to an unlicensed lab in Las Vegas – Sahara West Urgent Care & Wellness. The test this unlicensed lab was using would not prove a definitive result for diagnosing COVID-19, prompting DPBH to require the center to immediately notify all patients that the results they received were not valid for a definitive diagnosis. 



U.S. STATE DEPARTMENT CENTERS FOR DISEASE CONTROL LEVEL 4 – DO NOT TRAVEL LEVEL 3 – AVOID NONESSENTIAL TRAVEL

The Department of State advises U.S. citizens to avoid all international travel due to the global impact of COVID-19. In countries where commercial departure options remain available, U.S. citizens who live in the United States should arrange for immediate return to the United States, unless they are prepared to remain abroad for an indefinite period.

At present the Department of State is making every effort to assist U.S. citizens overseas who wish to return to the United States. As the Covid-19 situation develops, our ability to provide such assistance working with commercial airlines or arranging for evacuation flights may become more limited or even unavailable. In recent weeks, commercial airlines have significantly reduced flight schedules and countries have closed airports and borders with little advance notice. If you wish to return to the United States, you should make arrangements to do so now and contact the nearest U.S. Embassy or Consulate for assistance as needed. There is no guarantee that the Department of State will be able to continue to provide repatriation assistance and transportation options to the United States may be unavailable in the future. If you choose to remain overseas, you should be prepared to remain where you are for the foreseeable future.

U.S. citizens who live abroad should avoid all international travel.

- Widespread ongoing transmission of a respiratory illness caused by the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) is occurring globally.
- CDC recommends that travelers avoid all nonessential international travel.
- Older adults and people of any age with serious chronic medical conditions are at increased risk for severe disease.
- There may be limited access to adequate medical care in affected areas.
- US residents may have difficulty returning to the United States.
- Travelers should avoid contact with sick people and wash their hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not readily available, use an alcoholbased hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.
- All international travelers should stay home for 14 days after returning from travel, monitor their health, and practice social distancing.
