



Executive Order 2015-22

ORDERING FLAGS TO HALF-STAFF

WHEREAS, the Honorable James D. Santini, former Member of the United States House of Representatives for Nevada, died on Tuesday, September 22, 2015;

WHEREAS, former Congressman Santini was born in Reno, Nevada on August 13, 1937;

WHEREAS, former Congressman Santini served in the United States Army, and later graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Nevada, Reno, and a Juris Doctorate degree from the University of California, Hastings College of Law;

WHEREAS, former Congressman Santini served as a prosecutor and public defender in Clark County, and also served as a Las Vegas Justice of the Peace and an Eighth Judicial District Court Judge;

WHEREAS, former Congressman Santini was first elected as a Member of the United States House of Representatives in 1974, and served four consecutive terms honorably representing the interests of Nevada in the United States Congress;


WHEREAS, former Congressman Santini was a beloved husband, father, and grandfather; and

WHEREAS, Article 5, Section 1 of the Nevada Constitution provides: "The supreme executive power of this State, shall be vested in a Chief Magistrate who shall be Governor of the State of Nevada."

NOW, THEREFORE, by the authority vested in me as Governor by the Constitution and laws of the State of Nevada and the United States, it is hereby ordered as follows:


The flags of the United States and the State of Nevada shall be flown at half-staff at the State Capitol and all state public buildings and grounds on Tuesday, September 29, 2015, from sunrise to sunset, in honor of former Congressman Santini.


