



COVID-19 BY THE NUMBERS - NEVADA




STATEWIDE HOSPITAL CAPABILITY STATUS*

ADDITIONAL NEVADA COVID-19 UPDATES

[APRIL 21, 2020] Nevada's Certified Community Behavioral Health Centers (CCBHC's) announced that they are offering crisis services and telehealth during this pandemic. The CCBHC's focus on person-centered and family-centered outpatient and behavioral health services as well as primary care treatment for the entire family. Per their message, nobody will be turned away for inability to pay, and the staff will help in any way that they can, including assisting individuals with Medicaid enrollment. [APRIL 21, 2020] Nevada Attorney General Aaron Ford, along with 21 other states, sent a letter to the Department of Agriculture (USDA) urging the Trump Administration not to finalize a proposed rule that would take Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits from low-income Americans. In the letter, AG Ford and the other states describe how this rule would not only take away food assistance from those in need but also impair the national response to the pandemic while imposing major administrative burdens on States that are desperately fighting COVID-19. [APRIL 21, 2020] The Nevada Department of Corrections (NDOC) announced today that they would be providing distance learning to inmates. Since COVID-19 necessitated that NDOC modify their learning operations, Nevada educators worked to help them facilitate learning in creative ways, like offering real-time video lectures, delivering course materials directly to the facilities, and expanding the use of email. 

LEVEL 4 – DO NOT TRAVEL	LEVEL 3 – AVOID NONESSENTIAL TRAVEL	
The Department of State advises U.S. citizens to avoid all international travel due to the global impact of COVID-19. In countries where commercial departure options remain available, U.S. citizens who live in the United States should arrange for immediate return to the United States, unless they are prepared to remain abroad for an indefinite period. At present the Department of State is making every effort to assist U.S. citizens overseas who wish to return to the United States. As the Covid-19 situation develops, our ability to provide such assistance working with commercial airlines or arranging for evacuation flights may become more limited or even unavailable. In recent weeks, commercial airlines have significantly reduced flight schedules and countries have closed airports and borders with little advance notice. If you wish to return to the United States, you should make arrangements to do so now and contact the nearest U.S. Embassy or Consulate for assistance as needed. There is no guarantee that the Department of State will be able to continue to provide repatriation assistance and transportation options to the United States may be unavailable in the future. If you choose to remain overseas, you should be prepared to remain where you are for the foreseeable future. U.S. citizens who live abroad should avoid all international travel.	 Widespread ongoing transmission of a respiratory illness caused by the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) is occurring globally. CDC recommends that travelers avoid all nonessential international travel. Older adults and people of any age with serious chronic medical conditions are at increased risk for severe disease. There may be limited access to adequate medical care in affected areas. US residents may have difficulty returning to the United States. Travelers should avoid contact with sick people and wash their hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not readily available, use an alcoholbased hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol. All international travelers should stay home for 14 days after returning from travel, monitor their health, and practice social distancing.
