



STATE OF NEVADA COVID-19 UPDATES

[APRIL 22, 2020] The Nevada Gaming Control Board confirmed that it will continue to enforce the temporary closure of all gaming operations in the state as outlined in Governor Steve Sisolak's <u>Declaration of Emergency Directive 002</u>. Additionally, the Board issued a Policy Memorandum that outlines the <u>Procedures for Reopening after Temporary Closures Due to COVID-19</u>. This document will assist licensees in their preparation for reopening on a timeline consistent with the Governor's directive and any possible future directives. See the full release **HERE**.

[APRIL 23, 2020] The Division of Behavioral and Public Health was awarded over \$1.9M from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) to fund psychiatric care in Nevada communities. With this federal grant, the division will provide 24/7 psychiatric triage for Nevadans of all ages, including the Family Services Children's Mobile Crisis Teams, in both southern and northern Nevada. These programs will allow those experiencing a behavioral health crisis to have timely access to the care they need. This care will be provided regardless of an individual's ability to pay. [APRIL 23, 2020] Nevada Attorney General Aaron Ford, along with a coalition of 34 attorneys general, recommended actions to help homeowners in letters sent to the Federal Housing Finance Administration (FHFA) and the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). In the letters, the attorneys general applauded the federal efforts to suspend evictions and foreclosures, as well as showing their gratitude for the foreclosure and forbearance relief included within the CARES act. [APRIL 23, 2020] Nevada Attorney General Aaron Ford also warned Nevadans to be on the alert for scammers that are trying to steal personal or financial information. 

Confirmed cases of Covid-19 in the US



LEVEL 4 – DO NOT TRAVEL

LEVEL 3 – AVOID NONESSENTIAL TRAVEL

The Department of State advises U.S. citizens to avoid all international travel due to the global impact of COVID-19. In countries where commercial departure options remain available, U.S. citizens who live in the United States should arrange for immediate return to the United States, unless they are prepared to remain abroad for an indefinite period.

At present the Department of State is making every effort to assist U.S. citizens overseas who wish to return to the United States. As the Covid-19 situation develops, our ability to provide such assistance working with commercial airlines or arranging for evacuation flights may become more limited or even unavailable. In recent weeks, commercial airlines have significantly reduced flight schedules and countries have closed airports and borders with little advance notice. If you wish to return to the United States, you should make arrangements to do so now and contact the nearest U.S. Embassy or Consulate for assistance as needed. There is no guarantee that the Department of State will be able to continue to provide repatriation assistance and transportation options to the United States may be unavailable in the future. If you choose to remain overseas, you should be prepared to remain where you are for the foreseeable future.

U.S. citizens who live abroad should avoid all international travel.

- Widespread ongoing transmission of a <u>respiratory illness</u> <u>caused by the novel coronavirus (COVID-19)</u> is occurring globally.
- CDC recommends that travelers avoid all nonessential international travel.
- Older adults and people of any age with serious chronic medical conditions are at increased risk for severe disease.
- There may be limited access to adequate medical care in affected areas.
- US residents may have difficulty returning to the United States.
- Travelers should avoid contact with sick people and wash their hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.
 If soap and water are not readily available, use an alcoholbased hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.
- All international travelers should stay home for 14 days after returning from travel, monitor their health, and practice social distancing.
